From the President

In 2024, we asked you, our supporters, to “Invest in Dogs For Life’s Journey.” At that time, we also invited you to share your insights and feedback on the current needs and future prospects of our organization.

With your input, the DFL Board of Directors identified a critical need to add to staff. Specifically, the Board saw a need to hire more people in finance and operational/administrative support. The consensus was that adding employees in these areas would

allow more time for DFL’s Founder and CEO, Shelly Ferger, to focus on her passion - training service dogs for veterans – instead of managing all day-to-day aspects of operating the DFL training center and campus.

We expanded our “Invest in DFL’s Journey” campaign in 2025 by introducing a recurring gift opportunity called “The Sustaining Journey Circle.” The certainty of scheduled, recurring donations allows DFL to create a more predictable budget, meaning DFL leadership can worry less about monthly cash flow and focus more on providing life-saving programs for our clients.

Thanks to you, our friends and donors, these campaigns raised over \$130,000, with an additional \$75,000 pledged for 2026. Your support provided the funding necessary to hire more staff and move one of our existing staff members to a finance role. We are pleased to present Dogs For Life's newest puppy in training! This little guy is being sponsored by DFL donor and friend Linda Duncan, who christened him "Chief." Chief arrived at DFL on February 7, 2026, from Patriot PAWS Service Dogs in Rockwell, Texas. Does that sound familiar? If so, it's because DFL service dog Rocket also hails from Patriot PAWS.

Like DFL, Patriot PAWS trains and provides service dogs at no cost to disabled American veterans and others with mobility challenges. Both DFL and Patriot PAWS are members of the Assistance Dogs International (ADI) Breeding Cooperative, which enables purpose-bred service dogs to be shared among member organizations. As a result, we were eligible to receive Chief, who will follow in Rocket's paw prints, training at DFL for his career as a service dog.

Emily Vagim, a Digital Communications Designer with American Airlines, volunteered to transport Chief from Texas to Florida. American Airline's Puppies in Flight (PIF) partnership program with ADI allows employees of American Airlines to volunteer to transport service dogs from one ADI-accredited organization to another. All of us at DFL are extremely grateful to Emily for volunteering her time to accompany Chief on his journey to Florida.

Emily and Chief traveled on a flight from Dallas-Fort Worth to West Palm Beach. Emily said there were no issues at all; in fact, her experience transporting Chief went so well that she is looking forward to encouraging all of her colleagues at American Airlines to volunteer with PIF!

Tragic Events of November 21, 2025 Test Sheriff's Office Therapy K9 Teams

No matter what you think you can handle, you truly have no idea until you experience it. That was made clear to the members of the Indian River County Sheriff's Office and the entire community on November 21, 2025.

Our small town lost two heroes that day, when Sgt. Terri Sweeting-Mashkow and locksmith David Long were killed following an attempted eviction. We are not going to forget Terri or Dave or the impacts they had on our community; they will be the people we talk about and honor forever.



Every single person involved in this tragedy had to put their own grief aside to complete their job. It's the unthinkable, but you tuck that away, as first responders are so good at doing in the moment, and you continue doing what you are trained to do.

The Therapy K9 teams were no exception. Spirit and I did our job that day, as did our other therapy dog teams: Deputy David Partin and Gracie, Sgt. Ron Garrison and Buddy, Deputy Megan Boles and Raven, Dr. Kris Hasenauer and Jasper, and Sheriff Flowers and Miranda. Spirit, Buddy, and Jasper were all trained at DFL.



In the aftermath of tragedy, words often fall short. Grief, shock, and fear can overwhelm individuals and communities, leaving people searching for comfort in a moment when little seems to offer relief. In these fragile spaces, therapy dogs have emerged as quiet but powerful healers, offering solace without expectation and comfort without judgment.

Research shows that interacting with dogs can lower cortisol (the stress hormone) and increase oxytocin. In moments of crisis, these physiological responses can help stabilize people enough to begin processing what has happened.



Our therapy K9s stepped up and stepped in like never before. We were here and available to everyone who needed us, and those who didn't know they needed us, day and night, just to provide some level of comfort to our family of blue. Everyone was hurting, everyone was trying to stay strong for others, but the K9s know; you can't hide the hurt from them.

Our therapy dogs helped restore a feeling of grounding simply through their presence. The calm demeanor, steady breathing, and gentle attention slowed racing thoughts and eased heightened anxiety, even if it was just for a minute. They provided a physical focus that helped to regulate emotions when feelings felt uncontrollable.



Just walking around the building and coming in contact with people days, weeks, and now months after this tragedy, the K9s seem to give people a reason to smile. People feel a sense of relief to see a happy, tail-wagging dog walking toward them, just wanting to come and say hi. It's a moment of peace, no matter what was on a person's mind seconds before the encounter.

I do not believe anyone at the Sheriff's Office goes a single day without thinking about the events of November 21, 2025. It's a constant on our minds. You find a way to live with grief, but our therapy K9s are so good at sensing when you need that moment of peace. For now, that's all we can ask for.



One Lucky Dog

We introduced you to Gage, one of Dogs For Life’s service pups in training, in our fall 2025 newsletter. We had high hopes for this smart, handsome boy, and we all fell in love with his sweet spirit and loving personality.

Sadly, as Gage started to grow, he began to limp and ultimately was diagnosed with dysplasia in his elbow joints. He needed multiple surgeries to shorten and pin the joints, which doctors hoped would reduce the friction that was causing inflammation and arthritis.

The Assistance Dog International (ADI) Breeding Cooperative has impeccable standards, but of course they are not foolproof. Gage was one of the rare, tragic cases where a puppy placed with DFL through the ADI Breeding Cooperative had an unknown medical issue. For Gage, his dysplasia diagnosis not only ended his service dog career before it began, but also jeopardized his chances of having quality of life.

“We really struggled over what to do,” recalled Shelly Ferger, DFL Founder and CEO. “By the time he was diagnosed, we all had become so attached to him, and the thought of putting him through multiple surgeries with an uncertain outcome was heartbreaking.”

In the end, it was decided to proceed with Gage’s surgeries, despite surgical costs over \$20,000. Shelly says the decision was made easier because Gage, like all DFL dogs, has Trupanion veterinary insurance coverage paid for by DFL benefactor Kathi G. Schumann.

The other deciding factor was that DFL supporters Ilena and Rick Luts offered to adopt Gage after learning of his prognosis. Ilena and Rick welcomed Gage into their home in January. They nursed him through his surgeries and subsequent rehabilitation with lots of love and exceptional care.

Given the dire straits Gage faced, neither he nor DFL could have hoped for a happier outcome. We know Gage will live a long, happy life with Ilena and Rick. Needless to say, Gage is one lucky dog!

Reflection on the PAWS Pilot Program as it Enters its Final Year

“The West Palm Beach VHA is grateful to collaborate with DFL to offer the PAWS Pilot program to veterans with PTSD. Every year, we conduct four PAWS classes where veterans engage in training service dogs, aiming to boost their sense of purpose and self-worth through the rewarding experience of helping others. As the pilot program comes to an end in the next year, the VA is set to provide recommendations to Congress on whether to extend or make the program permanent and to evaluate the possibility of expanding it to address other mental health conditions beyond PTSD. We will keep you informed as these recommendations become available.”
