Dogs For Life recently received funding for the Off-Leash Dog Park to help reduce the cost and encourage more people to join. All dogs will still be required to be neutered, social and inoculated," said Shelly Ferger, Founder and CEO at Dogs For Life.

"We have been working very closely with our local Veterans, some of whom are in training with their dogs. We don't charge them to train their dogs to be Hearing or Service Dogs and one of our trainers is a Veteran himself. The old adage, "It takes one to know one" couldn't be more true. Many of those who have served our Country have been through ordeals most of us will never comprehend, but Veterans understand each other and we understand this bond," said Ferger.

Dogs For Life is one of only four organizations in the State of Florida Accredited by Assistance Dogs International. Once our Teams (owner and dog) are certified, they are allowed access throughout the world, including international travel and military bases. "This is very specialized training and we take it very seriously," stated Trainer, Jay Harris, U.S. Army Veteran. It's important to know that the training our teams go through takes six months to one year. The dogs are trained to perform specific tasks for their owners. As an Internationally Accredited Organization, we are required to recertify the dogs every year. Assistance Dog users trust their lives and safety to their dogs, so everything related to the training of both the dogs and people must meet extraordinary criteria. If we see the owners needs change over the years, then we begin training the dog to perform new tasks."

"One of the greatest things about this field of work is seeing how the person changes," added Jay. "Someone who has been isolated becomes more social. As we work with the owners and their dogs, we see a huge increase in confidence in both the people and the dogs. It's an amazing transformation to watch," stated Jay.

"We want our Veterans to have a safe place to go with their dogs...a place where they can gather to socialize and relax in the beautiful park setting. Whether they are going through Service Dog Training here or not, we thank them and welcome them to the Off-Leash Dog Park," stated Shelly. 

In response to growing needs in our community and beyond, Dogs For Life is constructing a 2,400 sq. ft. air-conditioned Assistance Dog Training and Administrative Center at our 4+ acre Off-Leash Dog Park on 12th Street in Vero Beach. This facility will enhance the Dog Park Campus and give DFL much-needed exposure to the public in a central location.

The center will allow DFL to train many more dogs year-round, as well as widen the reach of our Community Outreach Programs. It will also enable us to expand our "Service Dogs For Veterans" Program by enabling us to pre-train Assistance Dogs at the center.

The new building will house administrative offices for our staff and volunteers and the incremental space and central location will allow DFL to better serve the needs of the people who need our services. The on-site location will also enable DFL to offer different categories of dog park memberships and provide long-awaited restrooms for dog park members.

Service Dogs For Veterans A Message From Kathi Schumann

Dogs For Life, Inc. is one of only four Assistance Dog Training organizations in the state of Florida recognized by the Veteran's Administration to certify Service Dogs for Veterans.

As stated in the Federal Register, "Service Dogs Must Be Certified by ADI or International Guide Dog Federation for Veterans with Visual, Hearing, or Substantial Mobility Impairments to Receive Benefits.

DFL's prestigious ADI accreditation enables our Service Dogs to enter VA and military facilities, and our dogs' owners are eligible to receive Benefits. Dogs trained by other organizations do not have these privileges,

Our dogs have been turning lives around since 2001 because they enrich people's lives - providing ears that hear smoke alarms, paws that tap 911 buttons for emergency, and legs that provide access to an unseen world.

WHY SHOULD YOU CARE?

The sobering fact is that suicide is rampant5:

Almost once an hour - every 65 minutes a military Veteran commits suicide

Almost once a day an active duty soldier commits suicide; 349 in 2012 - a record high

231,000" Veterans of Afghanistan and Iraq already claim Florida as their home of record1.

80,000+ Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans will retire to Florida in the next two years2.

Extrapolating national VA numbers, the news is grim for our new residents:

- 3 in 10 will have a service-related disability
- 301% will suffer from the effects of PTSD
- 50% of those with PTSD will not seek treatment - 19% will report PTSD symptoms classified as
- "serious functional impairment" - 1/3 of Florida's adult homeless are Veterans, and
- 45% of them will suffer from mental illness!
- Florida is home to the highest number of amputees from the Gulf War-Era wars3

DFL is committed to capitalizing on our 12 years of experience to train Service Dogs for these Florida Veterans in need.

Our Veterans Are Returning Home ... Without Homes

A brief look at the national numbers also gives us an idea of what awains as here in Florida:

- 2.6° million Veterans have served our country since September 2001*
- 307,000" members of our armed forces are likely to leave the military in each of the next four years5

Current homelessness statistics do not bode well for these brave young men and women.

PTSD, Physical Disabilities & Homelessness:

What does PTSD have to do with homelessness? The sad fact is: - 2/3 of homeless Iraq and Afghanistan veterans have PTSD⁺

PSTD is even far more common than physical wounds among troops who have served in Iraq and Afghanistan:

- 336,000" have been diagnosed with PTSD (some studies indicate that up to 70% of Veterans suffer from PTSD)7

- 50,409 have been wounded?

While unemployment, poverty, lack of support networks and substandard housing are major reasons that many Veterans become homeless, a closer look reveals that disabilities, both mental and physical, precede and contribute to these conditions5;

- 51% of individual homeless Veterans have disabilities
- 50% have serious mental illness
- 70% have substance abuse problems

Veterans Are Disproportionately What's even worse:

- 1,400,000 veterans are considered "at risk" of homelessness"

Moreover, the VA says the numbers could be higher because they include only the homeless the department is aware of8.

Compounding the problem is the fact that our Iraq and Afghanistan vets are different from other Veterans. "They're younger, much more savvy and they don't necessarily like to ask for help.9"

No one who has served our country should ever go without a safe, stable place to call home. Those who keep us safe deserve our help now!

Dogs For Life Programs and Services

Assistance Dogs are specially trained to perform tasks to assist a person with a special need 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, to provide a life of self reliance and independence for their companions. Dogs For Life specializes in hearing, mobility and psychiatric support training at no charge to our Clients, Dogs can be crossed-trained depending on the needs of their companions.

Service Dogs for Veterans Training Program "task trains" dogs to assist our Veterans with hearing and mobility challenges, as well as the effects of Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. This innovative program is certain to give back to our Veterans who have given so much to assure our freedom.

Pet-Assisted Therapy Dogs provide warmth and comfort to individuals in need of support and unconditional love. Certified volunteer dog teams provide pet-assisted therapy for children and seniors. Since 2002, Dogs For Life volunteer teams have visited 33 facilities in Indian River County.

Community Outreach Programs feature a Dog Behavior Hotline, Dog Placement Referral Program, Dog Behavior Workshops and Obedience Training Classes. The Off-Leash Dog Park Campus has served 492 members since opening in February 2002. Memberships help to fund programs and services.

Pia Pia attended many outings in 2012 with friends, neighbors and families, which included dinner at the Olive Garden and breakfast at Cracker Barrel. We've been to Texas for 10 days, visited the Spaghetti Factory, Steak & Shake and the Burleson Mall where she performed perfectly. She

attended Jim's son's wedding reception and stayed right by Jim's side. When we stayed in hotels, she took to the elevators really well and comforted Jim while he was in the elevator by licking his face and holding onto him. There was a time when Jim was unable to go into an elevator and Pia Pia walked up five flights of stairs with him.

Pia Pia goes with us for normal shopping at Target, Air Force Bases, Wal-Mart and Sam's Club. She goes to Jim's Chiropractor and Counseling appointments and she was right on Jim's lap when he had to give blood at his doctor's appointment. She also attended a DFL fundraising event at the Vero Beach Country Club. When Jim needed to get the windows tinted on his car, Pia Pia was with him. The employees were impressed with her behavior and her attendance to Jim. She also attended the DFL Howl-O-Ween event in October at the DFL Off-Leash Dog Park.

Last year, Pia Pia attended a blessing for ca

and bathroom. When Jim became sick downstairs, Pia Pia came upstairs to get me from my office. She spun in circles until I got up to follow her, then she led me to Jim who was on the floor in the kitchen, too weak to get up by himself.

Many times during our trips, Pia Pia helped Jim to stay calm so that he can be patient enough to hear people talking to him. She will "speak" for him, so that he may encuse himself from a stressful situation and she alerts him when someone is at the door in a hotel, just like she does at home. She is able to pick up on his moods and distracts him with her playful antics.

Jim & Pia Pia attended a fundraising luncheon with DFL to tell his experience of having his dog trained as a service dog through Dogs For Life, Inc. Jim explained that without his dog he would have become a recluse. Pia Pia has given him a quality of life he would not have had without a service dog, and we are grateful for Jim's service to this country and the independence he gave to us all.



Service Dogs Can Help Veterans with PTSD

The Department of Veteran Affairs has long recognized the effectiveness of Service Dogs for Veterans". Dogs For Life, Inc. (DFL) Service Dogs already help Veterans with PTSD by task-training hearing, mobility and psychiatric service dogs, as well as dogs that can be cross-trained depending on the Veteran's needs. Specifically, DFL Service Dogs help Veterans with PTSD by:

- Waking up the owner from nightmare L.
- 2. "Creating a Barrier" around the owner to allow distance from people in a crowd
- 3. "Watching my back" - dog sits/downs with back to owner's back to alert if anyone approaches
- 4. Making a perimeter search inside of the home before entry
- 5. "Popping a corner" - looking both ways before person enters a room or long hallway
- 6. Barking when given a hand signal if the owner feels the need to leave a stressful situation
- Providing tactile stimulation to disrupt emotional overload of the owner 7, "Breaking the Spell" and/or combat sedative side effects

This critical help enables their owners to lead a life of self-reliance and independence.



On September 5, 2012, the Department of Veteran Affairs (VA) amended its regulations concerning veterans in need of service dogs. Under this final rule, VA will provide to veterans with visual, hearing, or mobility impairments benefits to support the use of a service dog as part of the management of such impairments. Two eyes are watching me. One is blue and the other is brown but they both belong to my dog, Spirit. She is never far from my side, waiting for something she can do for me and this was never more important than at 2:00 one morning when I found myself flat on a cold, tile bathroom floor tangled up in a walker and a wheelchair, too sick and too weak to get up. That is when I asked Spirit to "go tap help." She went to her 911 phone, activated it and two big, handsome EMS men came and took me to the hospital.

Spirit has been picking things up for me since she was a pup like bringing me my grandson's dirty socks. So when I wanted to get her certified, I turned to my friend, Shelly Ferger, and Dogs for Life in Vero Beach, FL to complete her training, especially the necessary public training that I was physically unable to do myself. They trained Spirit to tap the K-9 911 phone.

I could tell many stories about this dog like how many times she has retrieved my bird feeder or my portable phone that fell off my porch then down the bank into the woods, to how she won the hearts of all the staff and patients at Care Partners in Asheville, NC, the rehab



center where we spent two weeks after coming out of the hospital. There are no words to tell you how grateful I am to have Spirit and the many people who have been so good to us along the way.







Vendors were on hand to tout veterinary care, pet cremation and other services, as well as food — the fees they paid helped benefit Dogs For Life as well.

Assistance dogs for the hearing impaired is another service that has proven invaluable.

Dogs For Life also provides pet-assisted therapy, which sends dogs into places like assisted-living facilities to help improve patients' quality

was during those classes that the instructor noticed Jim's uneasiness and recognized the symptoms. He referred him to Shelly Ferger at Dogs for Life (DFL) who trains dogs to work with PTSD vets. Shelly worked with Pei Pei and for the last four years the dog has been by Jim's side helping him to cope and work through his disorder.

The story doesn't stop there. Jim has been so thankful that he was able to find a way to endure that he has taken on working with Shelley in introducing the idea of service dogs to vets. When they see how it works for Jim, they start to see hope for themselves. We congratulate Jim for his service to our country and for his work helping his fellow vets. 



'Armageddon' — a soldier's tale of the aftermath of Katrina

"The smell ... when we got off the C130, it hit me like a sledgehammer. It was like sticking your head in a toilet."

Former Army National Guard Sgt. Jason "Jay" Harris, of Vero Beach, said the memories — both horrible and gratifying — of his one-month deployment to New Orleans in the immediate aftermath of Hurricane Katrina will last his lifetime.

On Aug. 29, 2005, Katrina alammed into the Gulf states, killing 1,833 and causing more than \$100 billion in damages. One week later, Harris arrived in New Orleans to help the devastated residents.

He was a mechanic, attached to the 972^{ed} Military Police Battalion. He was part of a mosaic of units from all services, from all across the country.

The immediate need was some kind of base.

"We had the best first sergeant — I wish I could remember his name," Harris said. "He got us accommodations at the University of New Orleans," which is located near Lake Pontchartrain.

"When we flew in, the Air Force base (Naval Air Station Joint Reserve Base New Orleans) was completely destroyed. The runway was hastily put together. We spent two days there, basically camping, before we moved into the university." Harris said.

"There were people from all over in our unit. They called us the 'misfit battalion," he said, laughing.

Harris and the "misfits" got to work right away, disproving their mickname by quickly getting their base set up for operations and commandeering supplies.

"The Louisiana National Guard Armory gave us access to equipment, like a wrecker, extra trucks, Humvees and tools," Harris said.

"Lowe's and Home Depot were basically bust anyway, so they gave us any kind of supplies we

needed, toilet paper, you name it. "We were in a MacGyver situation — find it and get it, and make it happen. I certainly thank that unit (the Louisiana Guard) — they made sure we had fuel, trucks, even a fenced-in area for our 'motor pool.'

ferrying supplies to their base from the airport and from local sources, "right through the pumping areas," he said. "At that time, the water was still very high." And the smell from the water, a swirling mass of raw sewage and toxic chemicals - "a lot of people were throwing up from it." Death and destruction were everywhere. "You had bodies in the trees, boats, everything,º Harris said. "It was chaos - madness." The MPs got to work right away as well, securing perimeters and establishing cleared areas. "They walked in teams," Harris said. "That's when it hit me that we might get hurt.



"There were 150 of us living in the gymnasium," he said. "There were cots lined up to sleep on, male and female changing areas, no running water, only one fan, and we had to use MRE boxes as toilets — pretty primitive, bur it brought us all together, a real bonding." Harris and his unit-mates began

"New Orleans always had a lot of crime anyway, but law and order hadn't been re-established yet. "We had to keep our weapons

with us at all times. We didn't lock and load, but we always had to have a magazine in."

Only once did Harris and the MPs encounter potential danger. A "suspicious vehicle" was seen driving around the area, but it took off after its driver presumably saw the MPs, Harris said. "I didn't like to ask too many questions" when out and about with the MPs — "I was like, 'are we good? Good, " he said. Souvenirs collected from former Army National Guard Sgt. Jason "Jay" Harris' tin deploying to Louisiana in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina include a street sign and a University of New Orleans T-shirt.

A more immediate danger was the flooding everywhere. Driving, Harris said, was always a hazard. "My buddy Daly (first name Jermaine) and I were sent out to find this truck that had gotten stuck," Harris said. "Daly was driving. The water started getting higher and higher, so we made the decision to get back to the parking lot.

"All of a sudden, the truck began to tilt. 'Uh-oh,' [Daly] said. I said, 'Whaddya mean, uh-oh? Don't say uh-oh!'

"Then it really began to tilt. Water started coming in. And you did not want to come in contact with that water. I climbed out onto the roof, while he tried to get the truck moving. It was no good, so he climbed out, too. 'Let's hang out for a while,' I said.

"We called the motor pool. We sounded like smarta""es, I guess, because Daly said, 'They think we're joking.' I said, 'No, no, no! We're not!'

"They planned to send someone out to get us, but a boat came by with reporters and local people (in it). They dropped us on dry land, and we eventually met up with the reacue party.

"We called ourselves 'Skipper and Gilligan," Harris said with a laugh.

The next day, the water had drained enough to allow the truck to be driven out. "You should have seen the yellow-green color on the hubcaps," Harris said. "To think that could have gotten on us."

Eventually, once the security

perimeters were established, the MPs began allowing residents back to their home areas by ZIP code, Harris said. "The scene was Armageddon, like something out of a 'Mad Max' movie. Apocalyptic. People were just in shock."

But relief efforts began to take on a kind of rhythm, Harris said. "The MPs did their mission, we did ours, moving supplies," he

said. "It was the first time I'd ever worked with such an eclectic group. Even the cooks were going out (distributing) water and MREs to people.

"We picked up people who were stuck, we helped out everyone we met — it was the whole reason we were there," Harris said.

"People were so happy, thanking us all the time. The best part of the mission was seeing how much of a difference we made. When I went home, I felt good." Even personal hygiene for the troops began to improve from the MRE-box-toilet primitive conditions. Portable toilets were installed, and the Coast Guard unit allowed Harris and his fellow soldiers to use its shower facilities on an alternative-day basis. "That was awesome," Harris

said. "On the truck, Daly was talking about taking a long, long shower at home, and I was like, 'Dude, shut up!"

The overpowering stench permeated everything, and no one kept any of his clothes afterward, Harris said. "It just smelled like death, like a punch in the face. They did give us masks, which helped."

By the end of his deployment, Harris said there was a noticeable improvement in the situation.

"When we first got there, there was 5 feet of water. There was a lot of crime in the first couple of days, but then that was secured. FEMA cleared out the bodies, and the Coast Guard was clearing the dikes.

"The focus was on repair and rebuilding. Electric companies from all 50 states were there working around the clock."

A few days before leaving, Harris and his friends heard there was a Popeye's restaurant nearby.

"We took a ride across Lake Pontchartrain, and there it was," he said. "After a month of MREs, we devoured that food like vultures." All in all, despite the hardships, Harris said he doesn't regret a minute of his deployment.

"To see the city gradually pick itself up, to help people, to be a part of that — it's just the greatest feeling," he said.

Harris said he'd "love to go back and see New Orleans today, It's a beautiful city. Back then, it was more like downtown Iraq."

No sooner had Harris' National Guard contract expired in April 2006 than he was called back up to service via the Individual Ready Reserve. In November of that year, he was deployed to Kuwait. After 11 months, he flew back to the U.S., "my contract free and clear," he said.

"Back when I was in Kuwait, I used to tell people I wanted to start a revolution. 'You mean overthrow the government or something?' people said. 'No, I just want to do something revolutionary."

A dog lover, Harris found his current job as coordinator of the veteran service dog program. at Dogs For Life, Vero Beach, through his two white Scottish terriers, Fergus and Nessia. "They needed walking, so I took them to the Dog Park," he said, (The two terriers were soon joined by Sasha, a poodle, and Barbie, a Chihuahua. Together, they form Harris' own "unit," with Nessia as "brigadier general," Fergus as "lieutenant colonel," Barbie as "lieutenant" and Sasha as "secretary of state.") "Well, a few months went by, and I was working at PetSmart. My mother's friend knew someone at DFL, and I eventually met Shelly (Ferger, DFL founder and CEO). She's a great mentor, a great friend. "We talked about training service dogs. About a year ago, Shelly said the (administrative and training) building was going up, and the plan was for 'Jay to get hired.' That kept me going - I've always wanted to work with service dogs."

Editor's note: Please see last week's issue featuring Tony Santos and his dog Shadow, whom Harris is helping to train for Shadow's future as a service dog. At a recent ceremony for Purple Heart recipients at the Victory Center military store in Indian River Mall, Harris said he was proud of how well Daniel, a veteran suffering from PTSD, did with the help of his dog, Ariel (Daniel's last name is not released because of privacy issues).

In addition to his work with Dogs For Life, Harris said he wants to get a "Florida sled dog" initiative going. "Basically, it's you on a skateboard with dogs on a harness and leash," he explained, showing a video of himself being pulled along a street by four dogs. "It's a great, active way to exercise dogs, and the veterans, too," he said.

wisdom from dogs. Anger, frustration issues — dogs know. It's the best therapy to learn from each other.

"Things are beginning to change in terms of dog training. We're helping people learn to relax, instead of using tight leashes, choke collars — I mean, would you like to keep on getting jabbed in the neck?

"But we're seeing a real change from the old mentality. Now we're helping people see interactions in

Veterans and dogs can learn a lot from each other, Harris said. "I tell my classes, there is great

Veterans to get service awards in Melbourne

Gov. Rick Scott will be in Melbourne on Thursday, Aug. 14, at 2:15 p.m. to give veterans and military personnel recognition. The governor will be at the Melbourne National Guard Armory, 1889 Stewart Road, giving those who served and are serving the Governor's Veterans Service Award.

The Great Seal of the State of Florida is on the front. The seals of the five branches of the military — Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps and Coast Guard — on the back. Below those seals are the words, "Honoring Those Who Served." Scott hopes to get the Governor's Veterans Service Award to all in the state who served in uniform.

"I'll be there," said Garren Cone, president of the American Veterans Empowerment Team (AVET) Project, and co-host of American



Warrior Radio, a veterans-interest show on 1300 AM, WMEL. "I registered to go to the (ceremony) in Orlando, but couldn't get there. A lot of veterans around here got them."

Florida is one of only four states with more than a million veterans. The Florida Department of Veterans Affairs estimates there are 1.6 million veterans in the state. The Florida Department of Veterans Affairs is separate from the federal Department of Veterans Affairs. Among its duties are running the state's veterans homes and advocating for veterans interests at the Florida Legislature and Cabinet.

In a press release when the awards were introduced last year, Scott explained their importance. Gov. Scott will be in Melbourne Thursday, Aug. 14 to conduct a similar ceremony with veterans from the Space Coast area.

'Man's best friend' brings hope to veterans, others in need

Tony Santos of Vero Brach is an Army veteran of

up and down stairs, among other tasks. On Aug. 5, Shelly Ferger, founder and CEO of Dogs For Life, and one of her trainers, former Army

Sgt. Jason "Jay" Harria, visited Santos' home to check on Shadow's progress.

check on Shadow's progress. Shadow is an ecuberant dog — "He's smart, but he's 100 percent stubborn," Santos said — but he must learn to obey commands. "Let nue see you make him lie down," Ferger said

to Santos, who complied.

"We need to get him to lie on his side, because otherwise he'll 'break," Ferger said, referring to a dog's habit of jumping back up or welking away without permission. She took Sentos and Shadow through a series of

tasks -- from "down" to "stay" to belong Santos up from the couch -- and pronounced that "I want to see more tug and release, but he's doing well." After the home visit, Perger had Santos and Shad-ow visit the clubbouse, where Santos spends time each week helping out at bingo. The plan was to teach Shadow how to lie down quietly under the table

After two or three tries, Ferger succeeded - but she made sure this task would be necessary. "I'm up and down a lot at this bingo," Santos said. He serves refreshments from the kitchen, for example. "But my wife and I go to high-stakes bingo sometimes, where I'd just be sitting,"

Ferger's verdict: It's probably best to leave Shadow home on these occasions. Down the road, Shadow will receive training on how to use a special phone - "about the size of a small shoebox," Santos said — equipped with a button Shadow can press, which will call 911 when programmed, if Santos' wife, Debbie, is not home during an emergency. Shadow will then be trained to hark when the dis-patcher answers. If Debbie is home, Shad-ow will be trained to get her attention. Helping veterane like Santos - and, currently, another veteran suffering from PTSD — is a big part of Dogs For Life's mission.

"Our goal is to expand our service-dog

program, which is absolutely free to all veterans who need them," Ferger said. This is accomplished through generous ionations, as the costs can be steep. "It takes a full year to train these kinds of dogs," said Harris, who is the program's coordinator. "It's very, very specialized." Dogs For Life also conducts regular obedience classes, open to the public, which help offset costs as well. At the newly built administrative build-ing, Perger conducted the first class of

a six-week course on Aug. 2. At least 20 people attended, some of whom were dis-

She pointed out a number of fects about training dogs that even seasoned dog owners might tot be aware of. "How old is your dog? Small dogs aren't fully mature until they're 2 years old, and large dogs aren't mature till 3 years old," she told the class.

"How many families has your dog been with before you? There might be any number of behaviors that got started beforehand. "Look at the breed. Terriera are bred to kill vermin, while beagles are bred to chase rabbits. But even that may not be a complete picture — a retriever may not like the water, for example." Ferger explained that many dog owners misuse their leashes,

keeping it too tight. "You went a slack leash most of the time," she said. "Most people seem to think keeping the leash tight is the same thing as control.

It's not. "If you need to correct a behav-ior, give the leash a tug, and give the dog the proper command," alte said, "He will heel if you teach him how." As a model, Perger introduced Dard, a former how detention







Dogs for Life members are also thrilled about finally having an indoor plumbing restroom at the park, Ms. Stryker said.

"There are a lot of good things about the training center. I think when you train dogs in a group, the dogs will watch what the other dogs are doing, and the likelihood of more of them getting it is higher. But I do know all of us who come here a lot are very excited about the bathroom," Ms. Stryker said with a chuckle.

Generous donations made by individuals in the community made the construction of the building possible, even after a period where it looked like the nonprofit was going to have to fold, Ms. Ferger said.

Membership to Dogs for Life is \$365, partially tax-deductible, and includes open access to the off-leash dog park during daylight hours with a personal access code and notifications of upcoming events and classes offered by the nonprofit.

Right now there are about 100 dues paying members and 30 qualified members that earned a scholarship, Ms. Ferger said.



Dogs for Life opens training facility for service dogs

It's been a long journey from idea to reality but Dogs for Life supporters never gave up, and this month will open the doors to a whole world of opportunities for veterans and others in need of service dogs with its new Assistance Dog Training and Administrative Center.

Shelly Ferger, DFL founder and executive director, and her dedicated team have been training service, pet-assisted therapy and companion dogs since 2002. In 2010 DFL became accredited

All service dogs are trained at no cost to their owners, thanks to private donations, local grants and memberships in' the group's Off-Leash Dog Park.

"We are using the dog park as the equivalent of a thrift shop as a source of income for us," explains Ferger.

In addition to the new Training Center, the 4.5-acre site includes spaces for both outdoor and agility training, separate areas for small and large dogs and a outdoor park lighting in the evening.

The new building will house the DFL administrative offices, restrooms with outdoor access for Dog Park members. and most importantly a place for indoor training. It also offers an opportunity to increase services open to the public, such as dog behavior and obedience training, and outreach programs to the

"Before, we could never stay on a training schedule because everything was outside. In Florida it's never cool enough unless you're getting out here at 7:30 in the morning which people don't want to do," says Ferger. "So now that we've got the indoor training center, we can train year round and stay on a CONTINUED ON PAGE 16

schedule. Now we're going to be able to have individual classes and we can have them at night, without the mosquitos."

Designed by architect Tony Donadio and constructed by Bill Bryant & Associates, the new facility affords a variety of indoor training scenarios.

"In the past we could only work in the home of the people who owned the dog to do the task training, because we had to have a bed and alarm clocks, telephones, fire alarms and that sort of thing," explains Ferger. "This building allows us to simulate the in-home environment, so we can do the work here. And it also allows us to train dogs from outside of Vero Beach."

DFL's Assistance Dog Training, which aids owners dealing with hearing and mobility issues, was the perfect foundation for the newer Service Dogs for Veterans Training program.

As any dog lover can attest, tensions can be eased by just the thump of a tail from a furry friend. For veterans returning home from the horrors of war a service dog can bring about an emotional stability that is far more effective then drugs. DFL can train dogs in 14 tasks beneficial to veterans suffering from PTSD (Post Traumatic Streas Disorder).

She said one frequently requested task is called "watch my back," where the dog is placed behind the person.

"It's so they can sit comfortably in an environment of people where they're not so concerned that someone is going to come up behind them and assault them or something of that sort."

Another coping mechanism aid is crowd control, where the dog is trained to go out to the end of the leash and create a circular safety barrier.

"Not in an aggressive way; these dogs are not aggressive," stresses Ferger, noting the goal is increased personal space. "They get overwhelmed with hypervigilance, stress, fear; they're on alert all the time."

They also train dogs to wake a person from a nightmare by jumping on the bed and licking their face.

"And from what we hear, if you're woke-up by a dog licking your face you're a lot less combative than when a person is waking you up."

Others include: "popping a corner" to look before a person enters a doorway; searching a home before entry; barking at a hand signal; providing tactile stimulation to disrupt emotional overload; "breaking the spell" of a combat trauma trance; "finding the car" when owners need to exit a building quickly; calling 911 or a suicide hotline on K-9 emergency phones; carrying backpacks of supplies; providing deep pressure for calming effects; reducing hypervigilance; and serving as a security and loneliness "combat buddy."

"All our training is positive reinforcement; they have to want to do it," she says. "When they want to do it that bond is unbreakable."

Although the VA will not yet reimburse veterans for PTSD service dogs, most of the DFL dogs are cross-trained so Ferger says, "If it's a hearing or mobility dog trained for PTSD as a secondary condition then they can get their benefits from the VA."

The group expects an influx of veterans needing service dogs, and wants to obtain grants to hire veterans as trainers.

"Our first hired veteran and dog trainer, Jason Harris, is actively attending regular veterans' group meetings and events to engage and recruit additional veterans to assist as future Dogs for Life trainers. This effort will help the reintegration of veterans into our community and help Dogs for Life pre-train service dogs at the same time."

Unlike most service dog training facilities, which breed, pre-train and sell their dogs, DFL generally either trains a dog people already have, or assists them in finding one at shelters. "We are looking for foster homes; a lot of people are not physically capable of training their own dogs. Dogs could be dropped off during the daytime for training, and stay in the foster home nights and weekends."

DFL also has a Pet-Assisted Therapy Dog program, which trains and certifies volunteers to take their own dogs to senior centers and children's facilities.

"We currently have 13 facilities we serve at least once a week; some of them are twice a week," says Perger, noting the therapeutic value of a dog's unconditional love.

"Now that we have this building it's going to be all about veterans and service dogs. Our focus is on what we can do to train more service dogs, and we have to train more trainers."

One of their biggest hurdles has been that the public does not fully realize all that Dogs for Life offers.

"We have a resource in this community that is second to none. I want people to know that this is like a little gem," stresses Ferger. "We're so much more than just a dog park, but we can't make it happen without the money. We need the community to get behind this; to support Dogs for Life so that we can support our veterans and others with disabilities."



We are working now to furnish the building with what we will need to "open the doors" to the public. The DFL Board of Directors have worked hard to find sponsors to purchase appliances, desks, chairs, telephones and computers to name a few.

Although we are still in campaign mode to help with the costs of these needed items, we are moving forward and hope to open within a month.

Until the Center opens to the public, the gate to the paved parking area will remain locked, but parking will be available for small dog overflow parking in the paved area.

The future plan is that the property will have a one-way entrance & exit. Entering at the main paved parking area to the south and then exiting at the gravel driveway to the north.

We ask our members to consider parking directly in front of the building that will be needed for the public to drop in for information on our programs and to join the park. So we want to make sure there is always a space or two available in front of the building.

There will also be two full time employees who will need to park across from the building. Feel free to use the two handicapped parking spaces if you qualify.

The new fenced area just to the north of the training center, will be made available for use once the drain covers are replaced with something smaller that paws will not fall through.



As soon as the C.O. is issued from IR County the bathroom entrance on the north side of the Center will be accessable to members and will remain open 24/7.


We hope you are as excited as we are, to see this important addition to our community.



He spoke of two of the greeter dogs, one rescued from a hoarder, and another abandoned because the owner no longer wanted it. He then asked guests to "think about your own ani-



What you may not know about service animals

BY THE DOCTORS

Any are golden retrievers and Labradors, but none is considered a pet: Service dogs are actually working animals that are individually trained to perform tasks for people with disabilities.

Here's what else you should know:

Job descriptions vary. What service dogs do depends on the person's specific needs. Tasks can include opening and closing doors,

They're not pets. They are retrieving medications, assisting people who are blind or deaf, pulling a wheelchair or alerting to an impending acture,

voice commands, hand signals or other means, the ADA says.) The dog does not, however, have to wear an identifying vest or special badge. If the need for the service animal is not obvious, business owners are only allowed to ask whether the animal is required because of a disability, and what work has it been trained to perform.

Don't pet without asking. Don't offer the dog any food, and most importantly, don't interrupt or distract the animal while it is performing its task.

Service dogs are different from comfort dogs. Emotional-support animals are prescribed by mental health professionals to provide therapeutic support and security for people with psychological limitations; therapy animals offer affection and comfort, typically in facilities such as hospitals and retirement homes. People with emotional-support animals don't have the same public-access rights as those with service dogs. m

ID vests are not required. Other than a few exceptions, service dogs are allowed in places open to the public, according to the Americans with Disabilities Act. 

Dogs For Life definite boon for suffering vets

Dogs For Life is a "labor of love" for founder and CEO Shelly Ferger — with almost equal emphasis on the "labor" as on the "love."

"It's definitely been a challenge, that's for sure," Ferger said, sweeping an arm to encompass the sprawling Dog Park grounds in Vero Beach.

Nearby, a construction crew worked on putting up a building that, one day, will be the main administration and training center for dogs and vets to get to know each other.

Many returning vets suffering from PTSD or traumatic brain injury, hearing loss or blindness, can benefit from a relationship with a dog, Ferger said. It's her aim to be able to help connect every veteran with his or her own dog to help them live happier lives.

But it hasn't been easy for Ferger to fulfill her dream.

"It's been one thing after another," she said. "Originally, this was the town Dog Park, and Dogs For Life was a separate organization. Now, they're merged — but it took three years (of effort) to get to that point."

Other problems included purchasing additional land, irriga-

tion issues, construction issues and, of course, funding. Surprisingly, though, in the case of funding, the necessary money has always seemed to show up at

"When we were really struggling, one anonymous donor sent us \$200,000 — and within a week, another \$100,000 came in," she said.

"We even have a lady who won the \$25 million lotto who donated to us."

There are four main Dogs For Life programs and services: assistance dogs, for those with special needs 24 hours a day; pet-asveterans,* Ferger said.

The range of ways dogs can help vets is astonishing. They include:

 Waking up the vet from a nightmare;

 Creating a barrier around the vet to allow distance from people in a crowd;

 Sitting back-to-back with the vet to alert of approaching people;

 Making a perimeter of the home before entering;

· Calling a suicide hotline on a



sisted therapy dogs; community outreach programs, including a dog-behavior hotline, dog placement referral program, workshops and obedience classes; and the service dogs for veterans training program.

According to literature published by Dogs For Life, there are 231,000 Florida veterans of Iraq and Afghanistan. Three in 10 will have a service-related disability, and 30 percent will suffer from PTSD. Of that number, 50 percent will not seek treatment. "It's so important to reach these special K-9 emergency phone;
Providing a soothing touch when a vet feels emotional overload;

 Serving as a vet's "combat buddy" to provide security and ease loneliness.

One veteran whose life has changed for the better is former Army staff sergeant Jim Taylor, who lives in Vero Beach. His dog, a pug named Pia Pia (pronounced "pay-pay"), goes with him every-

where he goes.

He has agreed to assist Ferger in speaking at Dogs For Life fundraisers, and she said the Taylor-Pia Pia duo is very effective.

"You could literally see the change in him because of the dog," said Mary "Mim" Dunn, of Vero Beach. She is a past president of Dogs For Life, and remains active in the organization.

Dunn attended a fundraiser at her bridge club, and Taylor was the speaker. At one point, he broke down, and had to hand the microphone to his wife, Dawn, to continue where he left off.

Mary "Mim" Dunn, Vero Beach resident and former president of Dogs For Life, on seeing how a service dog helped veteran Jim Taylor, who suffers from PTSD.

"That dog came over to him, and you could just see the change in him," Dunn said. "His face, his body. It was incredible.

"If anyone didn't know just how much those dogs help someone who's suffering, that told you right there. It made my whole day."

Dunn, herself, has hearing loss, and depends on her assistance dog, Chance, a boxer, to help her get out and about.

The Dog Park has separate enclosures for

large and small dogs to run free, as well as one for agility and other training purposes. There's even a Memorial Garden, where people can either put up a memorial to a beloved pet or scatter a pet's ashes.

There are lots of trees and other plants throughout the grounds, as well as benches. To help keep the grounds clean, owners are required to dispose of their dogs' waste as soon as the dogs have "gone."

While Ferger was talking, several dogs and their owners came in and turned their dogs loose. One, a black standard poodle, kept racing around the entire enclosure, stopping only to sniff the other dogs, while the owners conversed.

"This park brings people together, not just dogs, as you can see," Ferger said.

Each enclosure has a water station. When the administrative and training building is completed, there will be offices and up-todate equipment.

Along the fences in the training area are "bone boards," which are square poster-sized boards containing dog bone-shaped plaques listing the names of donors. Ferger arranged them chronologically, from the earliest planning stages to the present. "There's always room for more," she said.

Ferger stressed the need not only for dona-

tions, but in helping locate dogs to match with vets, and getting vets to become more involved.

"If a vet becomes a trainer, for example, he's not only helping himself but also his fellow vets," Ferger said.

"We're really trying to get the word out both for them and for dogs."

Not every dog is suitable for training. Dogs For Life is one of only four organizations in Florida accredited by Assistance Dogs International, and Ferger and her associates are familiar with various dog traits. Anyone wishing to have their dog participate should meet with Dogs For Life staff and learn the guidelines ahead of time.

Looking ahead, Ferger isn't quite sure where the funding will come from to keep operating regularly, but, "somehow, it just keeps coming, and I'm so grateful. We really need it," she said.

Donations not only help with the building and grounds, but enable Dogs For Life to offer their services to veterans free of charge.

"Our vets are so important to us," Ferger said. "Let's give them a way to start living a happier life."

Take two leash walks and call me in the morning WANT A PERSONAL TRAINER? TRY A DOG!

A li my pants are tight. Every last pair. This is, of course, the result of denying myself precisely nothing during the holiday season. Instead of hauling out the free weights or rescuing the dusty Zumba DVD from its permanent resting place in the bottom drawer, I just look down at the eager, furry face at my knee, grab a leash and hit the sidewalk.

The health benefits of dog ownership are still being studied, but so far, the results are compelling. Dog owners walk an average of 300 minutes per week, compared to 160 minutes for non-dog owners. A brisk walking pace burns up to 200 calories an hour. Just getting up from the computer to take your dog on a brief break in the yard













shakes out the cobwebs and fills your lungs with fresh air. Michelle Fournier, owner of Durty Harry's Doggie Boutique & Dog Wash in Boston, lost weight and found a companion and a career, all by acquiring a lab mixed puppy. "Harry got me up off the couch and out walking. We put in four to five miles a day," she says. Her habit of sleeping in and skipping early exercise class was officially over. "Do you know how much energy a long-legged, teenaged dog has? I am in full stride with him by 6 a.m., giving me plenty of time to make the 7:30 a.m. yoga class I had always wanted to attend." She lost 12 pounds in less than a year, easily fit into her skinny jeans, got married, and started a new career. "I own two doggie boutiques and pen the 'Harry's Picks' blog, and I'm feeling great. This dog changed my life!"

Dog ownership has been shown to benefit the inside of our bodies, too. Mounting evidence of better circulatory functioning and lower amounts of the stress hormone cortical is being recorded. Noted author and expert Dr. Carole Lieberman of Beverly Hills notes the effect pets can have on reducing stress: "Stress causes everything from headaches to heart attacks. It wreaks havoc on the body because the distressed brain sends signals to the body's most sensitive areas." Lieberman contends that any condition a person has is exacerbated by stress. "It may cause flare-ups of diabetes in one person or arthritis Lively broads like this Visla can act as four-logged fat-busters.

in another and decreases the immune system's efficiency. By increasing exercise and decreasing stress, pets contribute to overall human health."

A group of stockbrokers in New York, arguably among a highly stressed subgroup of type-A persons, engaged in a study at the State University of New York at Buffalo. Twenty-four hypertensive individuals due to begin drug therapy for high blood pressure were separated into two groups. The first were assigned to adopt a dog or cat from local shelters, and the second remained without pets. While the medication lowered resting blood pressure readings for all the stockbrokers, those who had adopted a pet showed only half the increase in blood pressure when subjected to stressful situations.

Research results are in line with non-scientific

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Ask Amy

My dog Stella wants to chase passing cars, bikes or skateboards. She gets excited as they approach and lunges as they go by, and once I tripped and fell trying to hold her back. Make her stop?

- Linda, Aiken, S.C.

Rotating wheels are right at your dog's eye level and seem to beckon her to follow, so give her an alternative activity. Try saying "This way!" and make a smooth u-turn. Lure her with a meaty treat or favorite toy at her eye level as you turn. I hope your knees are in good shape because Stella's eye level is just inches off the ground. Practice first when no cars are passing until she responds happily to the verbal cue and turns with you. Try to find a neighbor

or friend with a bike to act as your helper, and have them go by several times while you put the new skill into practice. Your timing has to be good: give your cue and lead her at nose level with the treat before the bike goes by, not as it passes. You are counter-conditioning, which means you are changing her old learned behavior that of being stimulated by turning wheels - and giving her a new learned behavior. Now when a bike or car goes by, consistently give your verbal cue, use your treat, and praise her for leaving that bad habit in the dust.

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My two-and-a-half-year-old dog. Miller, gets fed every night at the same time we eat. He quickly devours his food and then goes from person to person whining for some of ours. We have never fed him from the table so I am not sure where this persistent begging is coming from. What can we do to stop this behavior so we can enjoy dinnertime again?

Dogs are ever the optimists. Any reaction from you is likely interpreted as a possible weakening of your Miller's best begging technique includes a doleful expression. resolve. First, feed him only when you are through with dinner. In the natural world, the pack leaders would get to eat the choicest bits first. Consider leashing him while you eat and teach him to lie down at your feet. If you have a tile or wood floor, place a bathmat or similar small rug down where you want Miller to relax. Wait until you sit down with your plate in front of you, then ask him to sit, and place a chew bone down between his feet, stepping on his leash to keep him from maneuvering around the table. The bone should only be available to him at this particular time so he values it. This keeps him from getting his nose up to your knee level to goad you into action and gives him something to do. Dogs love a good routine, so establish a pattern that Miller can really sink his teeth into.


SERVICE DOGS TO THE RESCUE

A lthough Vero Beach certainly has its share of wonderful parks, some residents may not be aware of one of its finest. With lush oaks for cool shade, numerous benches for rest, grassy areas for playing and trails for walking, the park is very similar to others. It does have a few special characteristics, however. A long fence separates visitors by size, water fountains are very close to the ground and squirrel-chasing is quite popular – not at all surprising for a dog park.

The Off-Leash Dog Park, over four acres on 12th Street and 16th Ave-

must be inoculated and neutered, for instance, and evaluated for temperament around other dogs and people. New members must attend a Canine Behavior Workshop, "where dog behavior, body postures, communication and canine park structures are explained," according to the membership brochure. There may be other dog parks in the county, but Jacquie wouldn't even bother checking them out. For her, the location is perfect, the park is beautiful, and the other dog owners are friendly. "This is where I want to be," she says. It might seem that owning and operating a dawn-to-dusk dog park is a sufficient commitment for a nonprofit organization's mission of improving "the quality of life for people and dogs," but not when the

founder and executive director is Shelly Ferger. And not when Dogs For Life actually runs this dog park to help fund other significant programs – Canine Companions for Comfort, for one.

Volunteer owner-dog teams visit many institutions so that patients and residents can enjoy the benefits of animal companionship. The program provides this unconditional pet-therapy through weekly visits to hundreds of people in area nursing homes, assisted living facilities, rehabilitation centers and other nonprofit organizations.

ogs must go through rigorous training and extensive certification, along with their volunteer owners. Of course, each dog must be assessed for temperament, as conditions in a nursing home, say, can be very stressful for an animal. Will a dog remain gentle with so many strangers showing physical affection? How will the dog react if someone accidentally steps on its tail? Obviously, a canine won't be much comfort if it growls or bites an ankle. Even when a dog has a great temperament, conditions can still cause stress, what with wheelchairs, walkers, clattering stainless steel, raised voices and bustling staff. According to Shelly, "One of the biggest things is teaching the owners how to recognize stress in their dogs." In addition, volunteers are taught various methods to help people engage with their canine visitors. "It's a wonderful thing the volunteers do," Shelly says, "bringing comfort to people with their dogs. It's truly a labor of love."




Dogs For Life also trains "assistance dogs" as part of its mission, an umbrella category that includes assistance for different types of

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Shelly Ferger is the founder and executive director of Dogs For Life. In addition to running the dogs park and training assistance dogs, DFL has an agreement with many local nonprafit facilities to provide visits from Casine Companions for Confert teams. There is no charge for these weekly visits. With the help of dedicated volunteers, staff, directors and donors, DFL raised 3550,000 to heald a much-needed Assistance Dog Training Center to further aid the community and Florida's combat veterans. Ground-breaking took place last month, and tax-deductible contributions are still needed according to Shelly, to support DFL's many programs and furnish the new center.



Shelly also helps many individuals understand their rights under ADA guidelines – especially those who might otherwise fall through society's cracks – and often guides them through the legal process of attaining these rights. If the phone rings at DFL, Shelly answers. If someone asks for information or help, she gives it, whether the caller is a client or not.

Dogs For Life does not train guide dogs for the blind or visually impaired. However, assistance dogs can be trained for a surprising number of tasks to help with many other disabilities, physically apparent or not. Mobility assistance might include tapping 911 on a special K-9 phone, opening and closing doors or helping brace a human partner who falls down. A service dog might be trained to circle and create a barrier around the human partner when a crowd is causing a panic attack. A dog can even wake the human partner from a bad nightmare. Hearing dogs are trained to help the deaf or hearing impaired by alerting for smoke alarms, visitors at the door, ringing telephones, even intruders; once trained for specific sounds, hearing dogs sometimes alert for other sounds they were never trained to notice, such as a dripping faucet under a sink.

The extensive training takes time and commitment, for the dog-human team as well as for DFL. Two trainers go into the home once a week and show the owner what to do; the owner must then spend at least 15 minutes a day or longer teaching the dog each task. The trainers return each week for more guided instruction, with regular assessments determining the team's progress. The training also includes visits to public places, including restaurants, grocery stores and doctors' offices. Depending on the type and number of disabilities, task-training could take eight months to a year, and DFL has even worked with a team for up to two years.

Federal guidelines permit individuals to task-train their own animals for public-access rights, with no certification required. Unfortunately, this sometimes leads to a dog's poor behavior in public. Shelly believes a dog's obedience and manners should be "impeccable" in public

places, and DFL's training and certification strive for nothing less. Among its other affiliations, Dogs For Life is one of only three organizations in Florida that is accredited by Assistance Dogs International.

Having a well-trained assistance dog can be life-altering, as Iraq war veteran Jim Taylor discovered. Jim suffered from severe hearing loss when he retired from the U.S. Army after 20 years, but he thought this was his only military-related condition. He believes many soldiers who serve for any number of years suffer hearing loss. "Even during training," he says, "they're around guns going off. You're always practicing for war." It wasn't the hearing loss that almost made him a recluse, however. It was the panic attacks that began without warning two years after he left the military. He had the first attack in a crowd at Disney World while he and his wife, Dawn, were waiting in line for a ride. The attacks soon became so frequent and intense he was afraid to leave the house. Dawn says his condition, eventually diagnosed as Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), became so severe "he couldn't be around people anymore. He couldn't even handle large family gatherings."

Dawn and Jim decided to adopt a dog from Halo Animal Rescue in Sebastian. The dog – Pia Pia (pronounced Pay Pay) – was intended to be only a "comfort dog," not a service dog, a sweet-tempered pet that might make Jim feel a little better, and perhaps help him leave the house to walk her around the neighborhood. They found an obedience trainer for the dog, also a veteran, who knew about yet another significant DFL

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one individual – Jim – rather than a whole family or audience. Although the dog did pass a temperament test, Shelly still had strong reservations. She agreed to give Pia Pia a try but instituted Jim would have to spend a lot of time working with the dog on his own. Jim was willing to do whatever it took. As it turned out, so was Pia Pia.

The pog has mastered multiple tasks to help Jim overcome his hearing disability and PTSD symptoms, in public and at home. And the moment Jim takes out the dog's little blue west to leave the house, Pia Pia is all work and no play. Jim can usually go into busy stores now, knowing Pis Pis will protect him and help him leave if he has an attack. He still fiels like he's "battling the war, every single night." But now his pug brings him safely home. "She just gently comes over, pats me on the face, and calmly wakes me up," he says. She's trained to alert him to a smoke alarm or doorbell. If the alarm clock goes off, the dog licks Jim's face until he wakes up. Jim laughs recalling hew he once fell and, too weak to get up, yelled for Pia Pia to get help. He meant for the dog to get Dawn, who was in the house at the time. But Pia Pia raced to the emergency phone and tapped 911 instead. The pug wasn't taking any chances. This unlikely bundle of devotion gave Jim back his life and the Taylors their home life. "She's one in a million," he 1201

DFL might reasonably accept that it cent do no more to achieve its misuion. But Shelly Ferger has a dream - one she won't give up until it's realized. Dogs For Life is raising funds to complete its new Assistance Dog Training Center on the Off-Leash Dog Park campus. The new facility will offer numerous benefits to local residents: a doggie day-care, yearround obedience training classes, a canine assessment center, restroom facilities for park members, additional options for park membership, more space for training assistance dogs and a hurricane shelter

for assistance-dog owners and their dogs.

But the facility will serve another purpose, the one closest to Shelly's heart: It will make it possible to help more disabled war veterans. According to one veteran fact sheet, "Florida is home to the highest number of amputees from the Iraq war and has the third largest overall veteran

program: Service Dogs for Veterans. Although the Veterans Administration does not yet recognize the benefits of a service dog for PTSD, Jim's severe hearing disability certainly qualified him for a hearing dog. The trainer introduced the Taylors to Shelly Ferger.

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Clients generally bring their own dogs to DFL for assistance training, but certain breeds can have the wrong temperament for task-work. Take a pug, like Pia Pia, for instance. The Taylors still laugh about Shelly's shocked reaction to first meeting their dog. "This is a pug!" Yes, so, what's the problem? Well, the problem was the typical pug-personality: always the clown, living for getting and giving love, all play and no work. Shelly didn't know if a pug could ever learn tasks, especially tasks that focused on only

A 2012 statistic states: "Local Veteran Groups estimate over 80,000 veterans [from Iraq and Afghanistan wars] will retire to the state of Florida in the next two years." Thousands will return with physical and emotional disabilities, and a task-trained dog could give many of them self-reliance and a more fulfilling life.

Right now Dogs For Life must train dogs in an owner's home, which means only local veterans can take advantage of this opportunity. With the new center, however, DFL will finally have the room to pretrain assistance dogs for wounded veterans, no matter where they live. When disabled veterans reach out for help, says Shelly, "We can tell them, 'Come to Vero Beach. We'll have a dog for you." @

Some of them may tend to react to unexpected loud sounds, walk close to buildings, and sit in the back of the restaurant with the wall to their back, always aware of their surroundings constantly scanning the surroundings. What the combat Veteran doesn't share about is the hell they may live in. They tend to be homebodies because they have made their homes secure, commonly referred to as a bunker.

They usually have an escape room that is their safe haven. Nightmares and flashbacks are the norm, they let us know we are alive today.

When the Veteran goes out into the public, they are hyper vigilant and on edge. They want to know their back is covered and long for life without fear of unknown. I have the symptoms mentioned and have been in PTSD therapy for over 20yrs. It has helped me to be better equipped to cope with life on life's terms. It is easier to face life today but I am a work in progress. I still have the flashbacks, nightmares, survivor guilt, fear of the unknown and other medical problems, some related to the war or because I am just getting old.

Muffie, came into my life 13 years ago when I got married for the second time. At first all I saw was a fur ball which I knew would be maintenance and extra cost. Needless to say she trained me and secured her spot on our bed. One night while I was having a nightmare, I remember a wet nose and something licking me which woke me from my firefight I



was in the midst of. At first I was on guard for this intrusion into my space but quickly felt the comfort that only a pet can give. She continues to awake me either by touch or barking, she has found it is best not to get near me when I am thrashing about in my imaginary battle. She is a God send. She also alerts me when someone is in yard or at the door. She gets me out of my isolation so I can walk her while she gives love offerings to the neighbors

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a 20-year deal to protect the group's investment.

"I've been a dog lover my whole life and I cannot tell you what this means to me and our other seniors," Welles said.

Rob Slezak, who oversees the city's parks and recreation department, thinks a compromise could be reached. He acknowledged that the long-standing plans to expand the city's marina would mean more money for the city's operating budget. But those plans have gathered dust instead of speed.

> Ray Neville, who grew up in Vero Beach, is one of those pleading for not only a water-related recreational use of the property, but also for a compromise.

Neville, who does not own a dog, said the space is not only too valuable to give away, but much larger than what dog enthusiasts need. He believes the city and all vested parties can find a spot of nearby land that'll make everyone happy.

"This is the only piece of property left that can be used at some time for

> aquatic river purposes," said Neville. "To put a park in that place is essentially pretending the river isn't there. And once it's done, it's done and I can assure you it'll never get undone. "The notion that Vero Beach is not dog-friendly is just silly in my opinion," said Neville. Neville adds that he does not want the city to compete with another dog park, Dogs For Life, Inc., which charges an annual fee of \$365 to utilize its park just outside city limits. Shelly Ferger, founder and president of Dogs For Life, which trains service dogs for people with physical challenges, said she has no objection another dog park within city limits.

Ferger said the main reason people tell her they don't like the island's present informal park is because it's not fenced in. "Not having a fence," she said, "is irresponsible."

Dell Ross, who is over 80 years old and walks her dog, Riser, to the park each day, said she'd be happy with a smaller official dog park on the island.

"If they take this away from us, my life will not be the same," she said. "My dog's life will not be the same. We want it nearby because there are so many elderly adults that use it. We pay so much money in taxes and utilities that we should be entitled to something."

New Park Outline:

- The main (paved) parking lot is closed until construction is completed.
- The new (gravel driveway to the north) will be the temporary driveway for members. PLEASE be careful. Only one vehicle will fit through the driveway at a time. This gate is to be kept open at all times.
- · Do not attempt to park beyond the chain that separates the gravel driveway from

the paved parking lot. The paved parking lot is for construction use ONLY.

- The new SMALL DOG entryway is just south of the shed. This entryway is for small dogs ONLY.
- The LARGE DOG entryway is the same as before.

- The Memorial Pavilion is a new off-leash area and is to be used the same as the Training Area (for those who agree with large dogs and/or small dogs). The flowers under the Cypress Trees will be removed next week. So if your dog has medium or long hair, we suggest not using this area until these plants are removed to prevent you dog's hair from getting tangled with burs.



The Training Area is available for use, but you must go through the main entryway
and then through the eastern gate(s) to access this area.

PLEASE do not allow your dogs off-leash in the eastern walkway.

Thank you for your patience during this week while the park was closed. We are looking forward to having construction completed and the driveway becoming a one way drive from the south to the north. 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The land in dispute, surrounding be Bob Summers ballfield just north of the Barber Bridge, doesn't have structures for dogs to leap over or drink from, or even benches for people to sit. It's just a place to unleash the dogs, ranging from well-coiffed poodles to bedraggled mutts, and let them run.

It's one of two informal dog exercise areas in the city. The other, a hardscrabble piece of land on the mainland in western Vero by the Elks Club, is sparsely used, but several hundred people a week use the one on the island next to the marina.

Dog lovers have mounted a wellorganized and vocal campaign on behalf turning the site into an enhanced, fenced-in version of what they now unofficially have.

But boat lovers want to see the 6.85 acres of land, estimated to be worth between \$1 to \$2 million, put to some marine use: perhaps an expanded marina, or a launching area for kayaks and crewing vessels. mounted their own counter-offensive.

"I'm afraid (city council members) do not understand the ramifications to our city if they vote in favor of letting this property 'go to the dogs," wrote St. Christopher Lane boating enthusiast Bill Walker in a letter sent to the Indian River County Chamber of Commerce as well as to Vero Beach 32963.

On top of that, as some arch-taxhawks contend, the city may need to realize revenue from the land once it loses the millions currently contributed to the general fund by Vero Electric.

"I don't know if the marina needs expanding or not, but to have that land only used for dogs, well, that is not something I am in favor of. I would like to see the dog park moved across from the cemetery on Old Dixie," said

Mark Mucher, a member of the Indian River County Taxpayers Association.

Dog lovers say officially securing the park near the ballfields is about protecting green space. Their vision of a dog park would be for all to enjoy, not just animals.

"We're concerned they're going to try and develop that. Before we know it, someone is going to come in and we're going to lose out on that green space. This is about preserving green space for future generations and there's very little time left," said 75-year-old Jim Welles, a South Beach resident who's

leading the charge to have the city lease the park to his recently created group for the nominal \$1 fee.

His group of 2,800 people who signed a petition promises to create and maintain a true fenced-in dog park. With about \$25,000 in donations, the group wants to erect a fence on three sides of the unofficial dog park; the lagoon would be on the fourth side.

The park would be created in phases with the group promising to pay for routine maintenance such as mowing the grass. Welles is asking for

'Tigger, a 5-pound toy poodle, gave me back my life'

Seeing-eye dogs for blind people have become a common sight in public places, but service dogs for deaf people? What can they do? Even if they bark to warn of impending dangers, how would their owners hear it?

The general public in the U.S. isn't yet used to service dogs for the deaf or people with other ailments, and outside of the U.S., even less so.

When Beth Sexton-Stryker, granddaughter of Vero Beach patriarch Waldo Sexton, tried to board an Iberia flight in Miami for Madrid with her first hearing dog, Bandit, a miniature Dachshund, the station chief first told her, "No dog!" She quoted FAA regulations and showed the dog's certifications, but the airline wouldn't budge.

"Yes, dog!" Sexton insisted, and finally, Iberia gave her two boarding passes, an extra one for the dog. Once in Madrid, Sexton, who's fluent in Spanish, spoke at a seminar to educate the Spanish public about hearing dogs, but even so, the Prado Museum at first wouldn't let her in with her dog.

"I asked them, would you let a blind person in with a seeing-eye dog?" Sexton said. "When they said yes, then I told them, 'Well, at least I can look at the paintings'," and they relented.

Sexton, daughter of Waldo's youngest son Randy, became deaf and developed balance problems when stricken with meningitis, randomly, in 1994 while she was running a high-powered marketing agency in Connecticut.

"I grew up across the street from my grandfather's house and across from the dairy in what we called the country then," Sexton recalls, "and when I left for Spain and for the big city in New York, I swore I'd never come back to this Podunk town. But like so many others, I have returned and I'm happy I did. When I got ill, I lost everything: my job, my company, my husband.

"I came home and I stayed in my father's rental house because I had nowhere else to go. Even though I knew I was lucky to be alive - my doctor told me I would have died if I hadn't made

it to the hospital as quickly as I did – I'll never forget how hard it was that first year before I got my first hearing dog. I did not even know what a hearing dog was! A friend told me to contact Shelly Ferger (of the Dogs For Life organization) and it changed my life. It was a miracle." Sexton is on her second service dog now and her present

faithful companion, Tigger, is a very smart 6-year-old toy poodle who weighs barely 5.6 pounds, but "size doesn't matter."

ligger has been trained to tap her ing when there's a knock at her door, when the telephone rings (she has a keypad phone), or when smoke or burglar alarms go off. He will also genby tap her arm in bed when the alarm clock goes off in the morning.

Depending on people's needs, service dogs could also be trained to warn their owners if the oven timer goes off or when they hear a baby crying, but Secton didn't need that latter type of

When I got Tigger, Dogs For Life sent two trainers to my house to train," Sexton recalls. "At least two trainers are always necessary, and often a third volunteer is needed. When training for the door knock, one trainer was stationed at my side and a second trainer was next to the door. But then we also needed a third individual to be our door knocker.

"It was challenging to train Tigger and required a real commitment and discipline on my part because I was required to practice every single day and keep a diary, which I had to turn in each week," Sexton recalls. "Before could even start training Tigger, he had to pass a temperament test and I had to complete a lengthy application. Then, we were required to attend basic and intermediate obedience classes.

working dogs. They understand we need them and they have a job to do. They take pride in the work. When the lacket goes on, I can almost see Tigger's chest puff up; he becomes more alert, and the way he carries himself changes. Service dogs are tuned into our every mood. If I'm having a bad day, my negative energy goes right down the leash to Tigger. If I'm happy, his tail wags throughout the day." Is it all work and no play?

"Service dogs are dogs!" Sexton explains. "It's healthy to take a break and play, and they do! They like to socialize with other dogs. Tigger's favorite activity is to go to the off-leash dog park on 12th Street. He has many canine friends in the small dog area and gets the exercise I can't give him because of my balance issues. But, even in the dog park, Tigger checks in with me. 1 watch him run to the far corner with the pack, but now and then his head turns to make sure I'm still OK.

"If there is any miscommunication, it's usually because the human member of the team is not being consistent," Sexton explains. "Once, at my Mom's house she wanted her friend Marilyn to come down. I didn't feel like going up, so I sent Tigger. Ever since that day, whenever Tigger enters the house, he immediately takes it upon himself to look for Marilyn. Once, she wasn't there and Tigger stayed upstairs a long time. Finally, he trotted down with her sock in his mouth! He may not have found her, but he found something!" Sexton is so grateful to Dogs For Life for having hooked her up with Bandit and now Tigger that she become a volunteer and then a director. "If I can help just one other person not to have to go through what I had to go through, it's worth it," she said.

Tigger hosts his own duplicate bridge tournament Tuesday, Feb. 18, at 11 a.m. at the Vero Beach Country Club to raise funds for Dogs For Life.

The worst thing people can do around a service dog is to approach the owner-dog team from behind and start to pet the dog. It invariably startles the dogs and takes their minds off their job while they investigate.

"The relationship (between dog and owner) is symbiotic," Sexton explains. First and foremost, service dogs are

"After I lost my hearing, I became a recluse and was afraid. My hearing dog gave me the confidence to go out and greet the world. I knew I had to give back and help others receive the



no eating off the floor or begging for food," Sexton recalls. "An entire pizza

was put under the table during one test - believe me, I was praying!!"

Tigger learned the "stay" command in basic obedience and "crate" to obediently crawl into his carrying case during the Intermediate class. All service dogs are required to be "invisible" when in a public place, and that allows Sexton to engage in one of her passions, playing bridge at the Vero Beach Bridge Center where fellow-players don't even notice him during a threehour duplicate event.

"I learned to play duplicate because of my hearing loss," Sexton recalls, "My mom tried to teach me, but I had too much trouble following the bidding when I couldn't hear what people were saying in a friendly game. But once we took a cruise, and I used the bidding boxes - in duplicate you can't say your bids anyway - I was hooked. As soon as I arrived home, I went to the center and started playing in the Friday student game! And I've graduated to the Open game since."

"This is a very exciting time," Sexton says. "Until now, we've been an in-home training program, This limits the number of dogs we're able to train. We recently raised funds to build a Service Dog Training & Administrative Center at the dog park. We'll be able to train many more dogs by pre-training them at the center. We'll break ground in just a few weeks."

Among other people whose lives were changed by a service dog is Jim, a veteran who came back from the Mideast wars with a severe case of posttraumatic battle stress. His service dogs pokes his head around corners to tell his master it's safe, creates a circle around him when he's crowded in a supermarket checkout line, and even wakes him from nightmares.


