Phil came to DFL after he and his wife Kat retired to Vero Beach. Needing a service animal to assist with his disability, Phil applied and was accepted into DFL's service dog training program. He was paired with Sully's Silver Star, a smart, outgoing yellow Lab with whom he immediately bonded.

Sully was a perfect match for Phil, and they became inseparable. Over the years, Phil and Sully gave back to DFL in many ways. They spent time with service members, veterans, and first responders; they visited fire halls and police stations to provide comfort to those on the front lines. Phil and Sully were ever-present at DFL events, and attended many other fundraisers to bring awareness to the need for service animals and the special assistance they provide our service members.

Phil even trained some of DFL's newest puppies, teaching them the basic skills needed to eventually become a successful service dog like Sully. Phil was honored as DFL Volunteer of the Year in recognition of his commitment to the organization. He became a DFL Board member in 2024.

We keep in touch with the Veteran groups in our county by attending services within each group, whether it is with the American Legion Post 39 in Vero Beach or American Legion Post 189 and the VFW 10210 in Sebastian. We also attend services on Memorial Day honoring and remembering our fallen heroes, and on Veterans Day, honoring all who served in the Armed Forces of the United States. Services are held at both Veterans Memorial Island Sanctuary in Vero Beach and Veterans Memorial Park in Sebastian. Sometimes I make a point to attend in both places!

Celebrating the Success and Impact of the PAWS Pilot Program

The 5-year Puppies Assisting Wounded Service Members (PAWS) Pilot Program is now in its fourth year with 12 cohorts and more than 60 Veterans having successfully completed the program. Graduates of PAWS have described their experience as “life-changing,” and have praised the quality of information received as “impeccable.”

Many participants have shared positive testimonials, emphasizing key lessons learned through the program, such as hope, patience, consistency, and companionship. As one graduate eloquently put it, “You can teach an old dog and a Veteran new tricks!”

One standout story is that of a retired U.S. Army Sergeant First Class Chaplain Brad C. Turner Jr. Through PAWS, Chaplain Turner gained invaluable knowledge about service dogs and had the opportunity for hands-on experience with Dogs For Life’s service dogs in training.

Initially motivated by curiosity, he emerged from the program with a renewed sense of motivation and purpose. Inspired by his own transformative experience, Chaplain Turner launched the Building Awareness and Resilience through Canines (BARC) program at the Miami VA. BARC aims to provide dog education, acquisition, training, and certification to Veterans residing in South Florida. Chaplain Turner’s dedication and innovation underscore the profound impact that service dogs can have on Veterans’ lives.

In celebration of these achievements and to further promote the benefits of service dogs, the West Palm Beach VA is thrilled to announce the 3rd Annual Service Dog Awareness Event on Monday, September 22, 2025, at the Thomas H. Corey VA Medical Center.

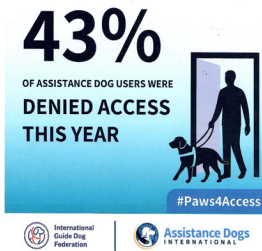

International Assistance Dog Week: Paws 4 Access Event

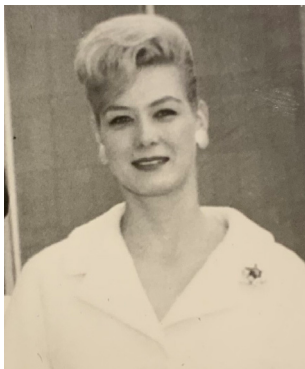


At a special event held on August 8th at the Dogs For Life training center, DFL celebrated both International Assistance Dog Week (August 7-13) and the birthday of DFL benefactor and Board Treasurer, Kathi G. Schumann (pictured above with her dog, Lady Bentley). The event promoted Assistance Dogs International's PAWS 4 Access campaign, which aims to bring awareness to the public access challenges often faced by service dog teams.

According to the Paws For Access Report on Assistance Dog Rights, which looked at real-world experiences of over 1,000 assistance dog handlers across 20 countries, too many service dog users face discrimination, denial of access, and emotional harm, despite laws meant to protect them. The report recommended a five-point action plan to help change public attitudes and behavior based on better education; stronger and more standardized regulations; improved identification of assistance dogs; training for small business owners; and legal reform.

Instead of focusing only on the negative, DFL recognized a number of local businesses that understand the law and welcome our service dog teams at their establishments. Service dog users in attendance gave testimonials about their positive experiences with businesses in our community. The event concluded with cake and cupcakes in honor of Mrs. Schumann.

Meet Gage!

Dogs For Life is excited to introduce our newest service pup in training - Gage! A perky, caramel-colored Lab-Golden mix, Gage comes from Ears, Eyes, Nose and Paws (EENP), an Assistance Dogs International (ADI)-accredited nonprofit located in North Carolina.

Both DFL and EENP are members of ADI. DFL's membership qualifies it to be a member of ADI's Breeding Cooperative, through which DFL typically receives 1-3 donated puppies annually from other ADI members with breeding programs, such as EENP.

ADI's partnership program with American Airlines, Puppies in Flight (PIF), is the means by which service puppies typically travel between ADI member organizations.

Diane Hurst, an employee of American Airlines, volunteered to transport Gage from North Carolina to Florida via PIF. Gage was Diane's first transport! Diane enthusiastically shared her experience:

"I work in International Sales/Reservations for American Airlines. I submitted a request to be part of the PIF program about 4 years ago. Last year I was told I was chosen to attend PIF training in Dallas, and I was overjoyed. I thoroughly enjoyed the training. This transport was my very first! I travel all over the country, but this was the first time an available transport worked for my schedule. I was thrilled and thought the transport went very well."

I was lucky to be traveling with my husband, Keith; it helped having an extra set of hands. Gage was adorable and very well behaved. He walked very well on the leash when I wasn't carrying him, and was very curious about the sights and sounds around the airport."

Lots of people smiled at him and, for me, that was a nice feeling. Once settled on the plane he was happy to sleep and only the pilot's voice over the intercom startled him a bit. Since it was my first transport I was a bit nervous but he made it easy and fun, and I can't wait to do more!"

Bob & Dallas - A Perfect Match!

Many of you know Bob Cheshire (USN), a long-time friend of Dogs For Life. Bob and his service dog Bodacious (Bo) graduated as a DFL service dog team in 2016. Bo served Bob for many years, including during the difficult times since his beloved wife Lynn passed away in 2022.

Over the years, Bo survived some health challenges, and the need to find a replacement for Bo was always in the back of Shelly Ferger's mind.

Shelly, Founder and CEO of DFL, knew that broaching this subject would be difficult, and Bob's initial reaction was as expected: He and Bo were not ready for her to retire.

Earlier this year, however, Bob contacted Shelly and said it was time.

As luck would have it, DFL service dog Dallas, a big, happy-go-lucky, 18-month old black Lab, had just completed his training and was looking for the perfect partner.

Shelly told Bob about Dallas, and Bob was very interested. Bob and Dallas began training together to determine if they were compatible, and to see if Dallas could adapt to Bob's needs – specifically, mobility and hearing support.

All of us at DFL held our breath and hoped for the best. Would Dallas take to hearing work? Would Bob and Dallas bond? Would the transition be hard on Bo? Would Bo and Dallas get along?

We are thrilled to report that Bob and Dallas are thriving as a new service dog team. According to Bob, Bo accepts Dallas as a "housemate," and everyone gets along.

When Bob leaves the house he usually takes Dallas, but sometimes will bring Bo. He makes sure she feels needed but isn't pressured to perform beyond what she's capable of at her age. The transition could not have gone better.

As for Dallas, the photos Bob sends us say it all – whether it's shopping at Tractor Supply, "supervising" Bob's workouts at the gym, socializing with other veterans, playing bingo at the senior center, or enjoying breakfast at IHOP – Dallas is by Bob's side, living his best life.

"This is the happy ending we all hoped for," said Shelly. "No one wants to think about having to replace his or her service dog, but the reality is that more than ten DFL-trained dogs will reach retirement age in the very near future.

This transition worked very smoothly because Bob did everything right. He recognized when Bo was slowing down and reached out to me when he felt it was in her best interest to take a step back from the daily demands of service dog life.

Bob bonded with Dallas separate from Bo, but once he introduced the two dogs, he continued to include Bo in certain activities. The three of them developed a new routine, and now Dallas is Bob's primary hearing and mobility support.

We are thrilled with the outcome and feel it bodes well for other clients who will face this difficult, but necessary, situation in the future."

Finally, remember that Dog Park members are eligible to join the DFL Dog Park group's Facebook page. We look forward to seeing Dog Park members at our monthly meetings, held the first Wednesday of each month at 9am.

Our six-week dog obedience class for Dog Park members continues to be extremely popular! Almost 40 members have graduated so far. This class prepares participants to pass the AKC Canine Good Citizen test. The fee is \$125. If you are interested in obedience training for your dog and are a current Dog Park member, contact DFL to join an upcoming class.

As demand for Dog Park membership grows, so does the need for Dog Park Ambassadors. Our Dog Park Ambassador Program teaches members, among other things, how to identify different dog behaviors. This helps keep the park safe, since Ambassadors are able to recognize behaviors that could spell trouble before anything happens, potentially averting a problem.
