

Officials: Don't be scared of dog park

Animal Control Officer says Nile monitor lizard 'afraid of people'

INDIAN RIVER COUNTY - Dog park visitors need not be alarmed by Tuesday's Nile monitor find at Dogs for Life Off-Leash Dog Park, officials said.

Vero Beach Police Animal Control Officer Bruce Dangerfield said he shot the lizard with a dart gun after it ran into an

oak tree outside the fenced-in property at the park, in the 1600 block of 12th Street. Though Nile monitors are deadly in an attack and would strike if cornered, they usually avoid a crowd, he said.

"They might go after a kitten under a trailer, but they're afraid of people," Dangerfield said. "They're known for climbing trees, but I doubt they would scale a chainlink fence."

Shelley Ferger, executive director of the dog park, said she sent e-mails Wednesday to the owners of its 240 four-legged members and told them the lizards pose no threat to visitors inside park.

"Safety is a huge issue at the park," Ferger said.

The only intruders she could recall at the park - which has been at the property 12 years - were a gopher tortoise and a nonmember dog that burrowed a hole under a fence to get in, she said.

State officials said the lizard's impact has been greater in other parts of Florida. In Lee County, more than 150 Nile monitors were sighted between April 2001 and July 2003, according to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission. Other counties have had sightings, but Lee is the only one officials said has had breeding activity by the nonnative reptile.

Dangerfield said Tuesday's Nile monitor was the third one he has captured in the past 1 1/2 years within the vicinity of the block.

Dangerous' Nile monitor lizard caught at Vero Beach dog park

VERO BEACH - Chihuahuas and Great Danes weren't the only four-legged creatures running loose at the Dogs for Life Off-Leash Dog Park Tuesday.

Vero Beach Police Animal Control Officer Bruce Dangerfield said he captured a 3-foot-long Nile monitor spotted at the park in the 1600 block of 12th Street.

with their tails. I went to the park and recognized it wasn't a gator."

The lizard fled up a tree, but Dangerfield said he was able to shoot It with a dart gun. Dangerfield said Tuesday's Nile monitor was the third one he has captured and euthanized in the vicinity of the park in the past 11/2 years.

"They were all the same size," he said. "I'd imagine this one hatched out of an egg one of the other ones had left. There's no telling if there's any others out there."

Officials for the Florida Fish

Wednesday to determine how the Nile monitor — which can grow as long as six feet - had been surviving in Vero Beach.

"They can eat just about anything except for a tin can," Dangerfield said. "The trouble is they'll go after small dogs as well."

Nile monitors are a type of lizard that isn't native to Florida. There are state prohibitions against personal ownership of the exotic creatures. Wildlife officials said the lizards invade nesting burrows and pose threats to the eggs of turtles, owls, gopher tortoises

Through The Eyes of a Soldier By Dawn Taylor

Per Federal Law the definition of a service dog is when a dog has been trained to perform a specific task for a person diagnosed with a disability, such as a Hearing dog alerting their hearing impaired owner to sounds and a Guide dog guiding their sight impaired owner.

A mental condition is not as specific as deafness or blindness. It affects each person in many different ways. To train a Service Dog for a person diagnosed with a mental condition, the task trained must be specific to the diagnosed disability. Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), for instance, is a condition in which the person has been involved in something that is very stressful as well as traumatic for the individual such as a soldier going to war.

Going to war, a soldier is expected to shoot and kill if they feel their life or a life of an innocent person is in harm's way. A soldier sees things that are not normally seen such as deceased people, explosions of vehicles or bodies and so on. During that time the soldier is involved in war, it becomes a part of them, in order to survive it needs to be. Once the soldier is home and life is supposed to return to "normal" the memories or haunting memories of those instances come back so real that they are

transported back to that same arena. This is not normal so they will begin counseling, not to get rid of the memories, but to learn to live with them. This is not so easy for the PTSD diagnosed person, just walking into a crowded store or having someone walking too close behind them heighten their senses to a fight or flight situation but which would they choose, fight or flight? A fight situation could end badly whereas a flight situation would just have the PTSD person leave with no repercussions.

This is where the task trained service dog comes in. PTSD dogs can be trained "on command" to create a situation where the owner has an excuse to leave a particular situation. This type of training is an example and is considered a 'task' where the dog is legally a service dog. Dogs must be trained for a specific task that mitigates a specific disability. Although companion dog qualities are very important to the individuals they do not qualify as task trained.

DFL has been evaluated as a non-profit organization in the areas of corporate and legal regulations, board and staff management, criteria for screening and matching dogs and clients, and that training these special dogs is professional and of the highest standard. Assistance dog users trust their lives and safety to their dogs, so everything related to the training of both the dogs and the people must meet extraordinary criteria.

DFL Joins 69 (ADI) accredited organizations of 161 worldwide members from North America, Europe, Australia / New Zealand, Asia and Latin America.

The phone was mounted close to the floor so he could reach it. Later he easily made the transition to tap a special 911 phone for Ruth in case of an emergency.



Tips for interacting with service dogs

DEAR ABBY: 1 am 18, disabled, and work with a service dog. I would like to share tips on interacting with service dog owners.

 Not all service dogs are big dogs. I know several Chihuahuas who save their owners' lives with their medical alert tasks.

 Not all disabilities are visible. Please don't ask, "What's wrong with you?" or, "What's your problem?"

3. There are many kinds of service dogs, not just guide dogs. Modical alert dogs help people with everything from epilepsy to diabetes to panic attacks. There also are autism service dogs, mobility dogs and hearing dogs.

4. Please do not pet my dog without asking me first. My dog wears a patch that says, "Do Not Pet." It's there for a reason. Please do not take it personally if we say no.

5. If a dog's handler seems III, it's OK — even preferable — to ask if we are all right. I once had an episode and no fewer than two dozen people walked right past me while I sat on the floor.

Hoping to Help in Pennsylvania DEAR HOPING TO HELP: Thank you for an important letter. Many people fail to understand that when an assistance dog is out in public, the animal is working and should not be distracted from its task which is ensuring the wellbeing of its owner. Your last tip was the most important of all. If someone appears to be in trouble, it takes only a moment to do the right thing and make sure the person gets

the help he or she needs. And that includes calling

911 if it's merited.

We love dogs, so I take issue with your reader, Richard Lee ("No dog beach! Is city run by dog haters, or what?" April 17).

First, there is a dog park in Vero Beach, close to the marina and the river. Indian River County takes pride in its beaches, and our beaches are clean. His accusation about dog haters is patently untrue.



Access Rights in Spain

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ADI Newsletter Assistance Dogs International Setting Standards for the Assistance Dog Industry since 1987.

ACCESS RIGHTS EXPAND IN SPAIN

It's amazing what a pint-sized Hearing Dog and a determined owner can accomplish on the international scene. Vero Beach resident Beth Sexton and her year-old Assistance Dog Tigger recently became the catalysts for change to the Service Dog access laws in Spain. Thanks to Beth and Tigger, Spanish laws are changing regarding access to public places for people with Service Dogs.

Beth and Tigger, a toy Poodle, learned assistance skills through training from Dogs for Life, Inc. which, since 2002, has trained more than 40 Hearing and Service Dogs in Indian River County and has certified 20 dogs. Dogs for Life, Inc. also assists disabled people throughout America and now Spain with information about training Assistance Dogs in their homes.

Beth, who is almost totally deaf as a result of an illness in her late 30s, previously owned an Assistance Dog named Bandit. In 1998, she and Bandit made a trip to Spain where Beth previously lived and found that Assistance Dogs and their owners were denied access to many public places as well as the famed Prado Museum in Madrid.



During that visit, Beth and Bandit appeared on Spanish television and conducted aneducational seminar for Spanish government officials to promote the need for Assistance Dogs. Although there were some Assistance Dogs for the visually impaired in Spain, dogs to help the hearing impaired were virtually unknown

show, Beth related the difficulties she and Bandit had encountered during her trip in 1998. She also explained the role Hearing Dogs play and the need for Service Dog access rights.

host that the outlying provinces had made better advances toward Service Dog access than had Madrid.

"I was quite vocal about Service Dog access rights and asked the announcer if it didn't make him feel somewhat ashamed that Madrid was behind the hinterlands in changing their laws." Beth said.

The show host concurred and ended the program by promising to follow up and see if Beth and Tigger could visit the Prado this time. Happily, they did. The next day, Beth was interviewed on radio and repeated her plea for improved Assistance Dog aws.

Through her contacts with the Spanish Assistance Dogs Association, Beth gained their support in petitioning the government for special access papers for Tigger and herself during their visit. The association trained the sole Hearing Dog. in all of Spain and told Beth that due to lack of awareness for the need for Assistance Dogs, there has been no demand for

Since that visit, some Spanish provinces have improved accommodations for Assistance Dogs, but like much of Europe, there has been an unfortunate lack of regard for the needs of citizens and visitors with disabilities.

During her most recent trip in April, Beth and Tigger appeared on a popular prime-time television show in Madrid. During the laws to be changed.

Upon her return back home, Beth received an email from the association indicating that the Spanish government wants to change the laws and will work in collaboration with the association to do so. Through Beth and Tigger's dedicated efforts, Hearing Dogs and Service Dog access rights in Spain will become a reality, thereby enriching the lives of those who need them.

Galicia in 2003 Base Country in 2007 Catalunia in 2009 Besides our work an other association, Arcadys, got the law in Valencia in 2003.

Our associates have also been developping a big work asking for access rights in their own cities or communities. This work has helped a lot of people and has made that assistance dogs are well accepted generally even if some comunities still don't have laws. This is the situation of Madrid, that has not developped any law even if we have worked very hard for this since 2000. That's why the help of Beth Sexton and all the people that during these years have given us their support is so important as you mention in your article. We were very happy to welcome her and her dog to

Madrid and AEPA-Madrid could offer her their frienship, as well as we use to do with all the ADI members that during all the last years have made contact with us to translate their ID Cards, to help them with travel or accomodation or to get information about laws in Spain.

Finally we are also happy to tell you that the Bask Association of Assistance Dogs (AEPA-Euskadi) is the only assistance dogs association in Spain (together with the ONCE Foundation for guide dogs) that can officially certify assistance dog. http://www.aepa-euskadi.org/reglamento-ley-bizkaia-en.htm
